Let's dive in!





## This issue's beach bites:

**Sample Size Reminder:** Reminder to all volunteers collecting samples on the beach to please ensure their final sample is a reasonably small size—this saves our microscopists hours of work! There are two tricks you can try to help reduce the size of your sample: (1) after sieving but before vortexing, you can swish the contents of the finest size in shallow water at the shore to help draw out fine sand through the bottom, and (2) re-vortex your sample as many times as needed to achieve a small sample.

**Summer Spawning:** Although our peak spawning season has come to a close, surf smelt can spawn all year round. Keeping up our sampling effort over the spring and summer is key for helping us to identify critical summer spawning beaches for surf smelt. And, getting to spend time on the beach in nice weather is an added bonus! \*

**PSS Forage Fish Program Logo:** Exciting new logo reveal! Over the past few months, we've been working with WSÁNEĆ artist Sarah Jim to create a logo for our forage fish program. **Nymph Point Park:** Nymph Point Park, or Sidney North Saanich Yacht Club Beach, is one of the top surf smelt spawning beaches in the region, yielding positive egg finds every month of the year and some of the largest number of eggs in a single sample. But, this area is highly developed, and the NE end of the beach has degraded spawning habitat. Our Sidney forage fish volunteer team has recently been "double sampling" the beach—collecting a sample from both the suitable SW end and the unsuitable NE end—demonstrating that the degraded NE end has much lower egg abundance and survivorship than the SW end *(take a look at the above table of results for comparison!)*. This September, PSS is partnering with Project Watershed, the District of North Saanich, and others to restore the NE end of the beach through sediment nourishment, invasive species removal, and marine riparian planting.

**Earth Day Celebration:** On April 22nd, PSS staff and volunteers, as well as staff from the North Saanich Marina, conducted an Earth Day Beach Cleanup at Nymph Point Park, successfully removing 117 kg of garbage, 150 L of loose foam, and one derelict dory. A grade 11 class from Parkland Secondary School also joined us for a forage fish egg survey demo, and our sample had hundreds of hatched surf smelt larvae! **S**

CFFN Annual Symposium: Did you tune into the Coastal Forage Fish Network (CFFN)'s Annual Symposium on April 23rd? If not, you can click the link above to watch the recording! Speakers included Mark Tagal ("A Surf Smelt Story") and Jason Hall & Melinda Paulus ("The Benefits of Shoreline Armour Removal"). A few CFFN member groups also provided updates on their forage fish work, including PSS. Check it out!

<u>BC Coastal Marine Strategy:</u> On April 26th, we participated in the Coastal Marine Strategy Workshop in Victoria, hosted by the Georgia Strait Alliance. The workshop, featuring PSS Executive Director Kyle Armstrong and David Dick of the WSÁNEĆ Leadership Council, highlighted the BC Coastal Marine Strategy—a landmark plan to restore nearshore habitats, reduce marine pollution, enhance biodiversity, and support Indigenous leadership, climate resilience, and coastal community revitalization. On April 12th, a resolution championed by the District of Saanich and City of Langford was passed by the Association of Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities that calls on BC to legislate the Strategy to ensure its implementation. With many municipalities currently updating their Official Community Plans (OCPs), communities now have a timely opportunity to align local land-use policies with the goals of the Coastal Marine Strategy, reinforcing shoreline protection and adopting nature-based solutions at the local level.
