Let's dive in!







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That's a total of 31 surveys, 9 positive for eggs. 200 volunteer hours went into these results—a huge thank you to each and every community scientist who contributed their time and hard work!

Highlights:

- Surf smelt eggs found at Esquimalt Lagoon Beach for the first time since 2022! Huge shoutout to team lead Diane O'Connell and her volunteers, who have been sampling consistently in the Metchosin area for years with no eggs. Congrats!
- The surveys conducted at Sidney North Saanich Yacht Club Beach: Site 2 on Oct. 9th and 20th were with two Marine Science classes (grades 10 and 11) from Parkland Secondary School, who took the samples back to class for analysis. In addition to the forage fish survey, we also conducted a beach seine with the students, walking out a long rectangular net from shore to catch any species in the nearshore waters. We've

been hosting education events for the school for years, and always enjoy the students' passion and curiosity for learning outside!

This issue's beach bites:

Student power: On Oct. 17th, we re-trained students from the UVic Ecological Restoration Club, who have been sampling with us for over 4 years. Each fall, the club welcomes a new batch of student members, and we conduct a training session at Cadboro Bay to get the new members up to speed and refresh the memories of existing members. No eggs were found in our sample, but now these students are ready to hit the beaches around Saanich to seek them out!

All Buffleheads Day 2025: Oct. 18th marked All Buffleheads Day 2025! This annual celebration hosted by the <u>Friends of Shoal Harbour</u> brings together government officials, First Nations, organizations, and local residents to celebrate the remarkably punctual migratory return of North America's smallest diving sea duck. The buffleheads that overwinter in the Salish Sea return to the Shoal Harbour Migratory Bird Sanctuary on October 15th every year —the 297th day of the solar cycle. We were honoured to speak before the group on the importance of forage fish, their connection to the coastal food web, and the importance of protecting natural shorelines. Team expansion: To fill gaps in our sampling coverage and help strengthen the effort of our existing teams, we'll be conducting ongoing training sessions for new volunteers. We have four November dates now open for registration across various beaches:

Upcoming events: We have some exciting events coming up at the end of November! Dates, times, and locations are TBD — stay tuned. ☺

- **(1)** Forage Fish Social In collaboration with the <u>Gorge Waterway Action Society (GWAS)</u>, who will be sampling throughout the Gorge Waterway this winter for a habitat suitability and toxicology project, we're hosting a forage fish social featuring presentations, egg viewing, and mingling.
- **(2)** Forage Fish Egg Microscopy Workshop In collaboration with Moira Galbraith, DFO Zooplankton Biologist, we're hosting a small workshop in the zooplankton laboratory at the Institute of Ocean Sciences in Sidney. This workshop will review identification of forage fish eggs, stages of embryo development, and microscopy best practices.

Day falling on Nov. 3rd. This highlighted week/day is all about raising awareness of this important cryptic forage fish species. The goal is for teams across the coast to conduct several surveys in this window, allowing for more comparable data. There will also be an educational social media campaign from all members of the CFFN to help spread knowledge of this largely unknown species!

Songhees Walkway Pocket Beach is now Green Shores certified

Our Songhees Walkway Pocket Beach Restoration Project has been approved for <u>Green Shores for Shoreline Development (GSSD) certification</u>. This project restored a highly modified shoreline by Lime Bay Park in Victoria Harbour, creating a small forage fish pocket beach habitat. The beach now serves as a Green Shores demonstration site under the <u>Resilient Coasts for Salmon program</u>.

3rd Victoria Herring Symposium

Last night we attended the <u>3rd Victoria Herring Symposium</u>, hosted by the <u>Herring Conservation and Restoration Society</u>. Speakers included <u>Tsawout Hereditary Chief Eric Pelkey</u>, Sydney Dixon from <u>Pacific Wild</u>, and Sydney McCabe & Lili Wilson from <u>Eagle Wing Tours</u>. Pacific Wild has excellent letter templates that you can submit to your local representatives and Fisheries Minister, Joanne Thompson, telling them that you support an immediate moratorium and movement towards an ecosystem-based approach to management of the herring fishery.
