The project has supported the re-establishment of WSÁNEĆ plants used for food and medicine, strengthening cultural connections to the land while restoring ecosystem health. The site has become a living classroom, empowering youth, students, and community members to learn by doing and to carry stewardship values forward. By integrating Indigenous Knowledge with modern conservation practices, this project demonstrates how ecological restoration can also serve as a powerful pathway for cultural revitalization and long-term community resilience.
